As upperclassmen we have had our fair share of slow brothers/sisters and carpool buddies causing us to be late on many occasions. From siblings taking what seems like hour-long showers to your carpool buddy leaving the state to shoot geese without telling you, there are many challenges that can cause you to be late. To sum it up....being late STINKS, especially when it's not your fault, but these are some reasons why you should strive to be on time.

- Having to walk into a classroom 10 minutes late while everyone in the room awkwardly stares at you while you hand your hall pass to the teacher is horrible. It only makes it worse when your so-called "friends" are there to humiliate you even more, and who knows when they will ever let it go. Whenever this event happens, it feels as if a small piece of your soul dies.
- Another bad part about being tardy is it could seriously affect your grade in a negative way. It could be as bad as dropping a whole letter grade or worse.
- HE IS WAITING FOR YOU! "Who is HE?" you might be asking; HE is Mr. Fishburn. You are allowed 6 lates before the Tardy Protocol begins.

WHEN DOES SCHOOL START?

You are expected to be at school prior to the 8:30am bell.

Although the bell schedule directs us through the day, the classroom teacher dismisses you from the class. You should be in your seat, with your materials, and ready to begin when the bell rings. You should not close your books or start to leave a class until the teacher has indicated that you are dismissed.

WHAT IF I'M LATE TO CLASS?

Once you're at school, we think it's important to be punctual as you go from class to class. Between each class period you have 5 minutes to take care of any necessary business before going to the next class.

If you do arrive late to class, you must have a pass or you will be counted as tardy. Each student is allowed 3 tardies per nine weeks without penalty. The 4th tardy will result in a consequence as directed by the classroom teacher. Excessive tardies can result in parent conferences, long-term detentions, suspensions or removal from a class.

After 6 violations, any unexcused late arrival or tardy immediately initiates discipline process

- 7 1 hour detention after school (on Wednesdays)
- 8-10 45 minutes detention (before AND after school)
- 11-13 Student work program before school (7am start)
- 14-15 2 hour Saturday School (\$10/hour)
- 16-17 3 hour Saturday School (\$10/hour)
- 18-20 4 hour Saturday School (\$10/hour)
- 20+ Parent meeting and in-school suspension (if appropriate)
- 25+ Will be handled case-by-case, but can result in prolonged suspensions or even dismissal from the school

ATTENDANCE

WHAT IF I'M LATE TO SCHOOL?

If you are late for school [8:30am], you must sign in at the office upon your arrival and get a pass that allows you into class. It is important that a parent notify the school as to the reason for being late. Your excessive tardies can result in parent conferences, long-term detentions, suspensions or failure of the 1st period class. When a student is more than 15 minutes late to class, it is documented as a full period absence.

WHAT IF I DON'T SHOW UP AT ALL?

Absences will be recorded as either excused or unexcused. Attendance records are kept as part of the student's permanent record. Students who are absent (excused or unexcused) more than 10 days in a semester will not receive credit for that class.

MAKE-UP ASSIGNMENTS

You are allowed to make up work missed during an excused absence. You are responsible for arranging to make up missed work. Use the Prearranged Absence form, located in the office, as a means of communicating with your teachers. It is your

EXCUSED ABSENCES

Excused absences include, but are not limited to:

- Death in the family
- Student injury or illness
- Appointments that cannot be scheduled outside school hours
- Extreme transportation and/or weather problems

With the exception of college visits, all of the aforementioned reasons for an excused absence will count in the total number of absences allowed in a semester

Excessive absences due to special circumstances will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis.

In accordance with Indiana Code 20-8.1-3-18, students supplying the proper notification to the office and participating in the following events are not counted absent:

- Page or honoree in the Indiana General Assembly
- Subpoenaed court appearance
- Helper to political candidate or election process
- National Guard duty
- School-sponsored field trips
- School-sanctioned college visits

responsibility to contact each teacher about all tests and assignments missed and to complete all make-up work within the specified time period. Generally, you have one day to make up assignments given during the time you were absent commensurate with the total number of days missed. If there is a pre-scheduled test or project due on the day that you are absent, you should be prepared to satisfy those requirements upon your return to school. We will be as flexible as possible, but we believe that no student can achieve his or her full potential without the benefit of punctual and regular attendance.


To reinforce the important concepts of each class, CCHS requires students complete all final examinations. If a student misses a final examination AND has an excused absence, the final grade in that course will be recorded as an "incomplete" until the exam can be completed at a mutually agreed upon time.


Unexcused absences will result in zero credit for the work assigned, including exams, during the classes missed. A student who has accumulated more than three days of unexcused absences in a nine weeks grading period will fail all classes impacted by those absences.

WHAT IS SRT? WHAT CAN I DO DURING SRT?

If you're new to Covenant you might see the term "SRT" on the schedule and be very confused. Well no need to fear, SRT stands for Student Resource Time, not Sleep and Relax Time, contrary to to how some students spend it. SRT is a beautiful gift that allows you to do many things such as seek help from teachers in a class in which you might be struggling, do your homework that's due the next day (or next period), or simply take that 10 minutes to de-stress from the Covenant school day.

SRT happens every day, but it comes in different forms. Monday SRT is only 10 minutes long. This is a nice break between the long stretch of classes on Monday, and it is the perfect length to grab a snack to recharge before the next few classes. Tuesday and Thursday SRT is 35 minutes. This is a long time, and if you use it wisely you can reduce your homework time by close to an hour! Wednesday SRT is 10 minutes, and those are good days to seek help from teachers on an assignment you missed while absent, or even one you just don't quite understand. Friday SRT takes the form of Morning Assembly. This is a time where someone will get up and share a message for the entire Covenant Community. If the speaker does not use the full 40 minutes, then the remaining time will be regular SRT.

During SRT you can go many places, like the Library/Media Center, Computer Lab, Classrooms, and the Commons. You can also use the Weight Room and Gym as long as you have a weight coach with you. The possibilities are endless! SRT is a great time in the day to do what you need to be a better student. It can be tempting to spend the time talking with friends about the "Parks and Rec" episode you just watched, but if used wisely, it can be a very valuable time to keep you from stressing out about all the homework you will have that night.

The following policy is designed to dignify all persons in our community, to aid in the cultivation of relationships, as well as maintain an educational focus in the classroom and other study areas. For the following policy, 'other electronic device' denotes mobile phones, smart phones, gaming devices, smart watches, ipods, or any similar device that provides an interface with the Internet, access content from the Internet, or has communication with other devices wirelessly.

The following policies are listed for the 2022-23 school year:

- 1. ONLY your Personal Education Devices are permitted during classroom time. Cell phones or other electronic devices will be silenced and stored in the designated organizers for each classroom.
- 2. Any cell phone or other electronic device that is seen, heard, or in any way causes a disruption to class will be confiscated and delivered to the Dean of Students for the remainder of the day.
- Any cell phone or other electronic device found or seen during any kind of formal testing (quizzes, tests, standardized exams, etc.) will be confiscated, delivered to the Dean of Students, and treated as academic dishonesty.
- 4. All electronic listening devices will be put away during directed academic classroom time (including school assemblies), or will otherwise be confiscated and delivered to the Dean of Students.
